Take Me Out to the Ballgame, Not the Emergency Room

Physicians from the largest and busiest emergency department in the state of Missouri are involved in care outside the hospital walls. When they are not taking care of patients at Barnes-Jewish Hospital, Washington University emergency medicine physicians can be found at the ballpark and even rock concerts.

When a young boy from Louisville, Kentucky, injured his elbow at a Cardinals game, Doug Char, MD, was able to pop it back into place saving the family a costly visit to the emergency room. The family was back in their seats before the game's first pitch.

"The whole thing took about 20 minutes," says Dr. Char, Washington University emergency medicine physician at Barnes-Jewish Hospital. "Years ago, a nurse, paramedic and primary care physician staffed the first aid station, and most injuries had to be sent to the emergency room. Now, we often have an emergencymedicine-trained physician assigned to the stadium who can offer intervention."

For the past three years, Washington University emergency medicine physicians at Barnes-Jewish Hospital have helped staff the first aid stations at many of the Cardinals games at Busch Stadium and other events in the city and stadium including the U2 concert this summer and even Mardi Gras.

"We're happy to do it," says Dr. Char. "After you pay for tickets, parking and food, the last thing you want to do is leave to go to the emergency room. It's nice to know that our presence ensures that minor complaints can be dealt with on site and that seriously ill fans can be assessed and directed to the appropriate emergency facility."



Dedicated to Heart Care

Earlier this year at Washington University and Barnes-Jewish Hospital, the departments of cardiology, cardiothoracic surgery and vascular surgery joined to form a new Heart & Vascular Center.

Nine floors are now dedicated to treating heart and vascular patients, in addition to the cardiac procedure center and the cardiac diagnostic lab. Seven of these floors are located in Queeny Tower and the adjacent Rand Johnson building. The Queeny Tower lobby has been renovated and is now the new Heart & Vascular Center lobby.

Knowledgeable concierge staff are available in the lobby to escort patients to their destinations within the Heart & Vascular Center.

"Having a single point of entry will make access so much easier for our heart and vascular patients," says Doug Mann, MD, chief of cardiology at Barnes-Jewish Hospital and Washington University School of Medicine. "Patients will receive their care from an integrated team of physicians and nurses who are national leaders in the treatment of heart and vascular disease.

"Our patients are already benefitting from the improved integration and coordination of care of our heart and vascular service lines," says Dr. Mann.



From Match Day to Wedding Day

"Match Day" was more than just a day to accept a job for Fiorella Krapp Lopez, MD, and Enrique Cornejo Cisneros, MD. This was the day the couple would find out where they would begin their lives as doctors and as husband and wife. Match Day is when recent medical school graduates find out which teaching hospital will be accepting them as residents to complete their medical training. For this young couple from Peru, Barnes-Jewish Hospital was their first choice.

Fiorella met Enrique in medical school at the Universidad Peruana Cayetano Heredia in Lima, Peru. They finished medical school together and graduated at the top of their class. They completed rotations together for the next few years, and finally the couple was ready for the match.

After interviewing across the United States for residencies, Fiorella and Enrique submitted their rank-order list for their residency match. They applied as a couple, meaning they would accept a residency only with each other, and each put Barnes-Jewish Hospital as their number one pick.

After 15 flights across the country for different interviews, the couple returned to Lima to plan their wedding. The week before they were married, they learned that Barnes-Jewish Hospital put the two at the top of its list, too. "Really, we celebrated two things on our wedding day," says Fiorella.

In July, the couple moved to the Central West End to begin their residencies at the hospital. The neighborhood was a major selling point when ranking their residency programs. "I absolutely love the neighborhood," says Fiorella. "It was so welcoming when I came here to interview. We are used to walking places in Peru, but it's not possible to live within walking distance to work. Here, we can walk anywhere and there are so many places to go." Fiorella gushes about everything from Forest Park to the outdoor dining areas to all of the neighborhood dogs. "Oh, she loves the dogs," her husband repeats.

"I had heard of Barnes-Jewish Hospital even in Peru," says Enrique. "It has a great reputation. Washington University physicians offer some of the best training, and the hospital is one of the best even from the patients' perspective. It has it all."

Enrique says that the residency program is mindful to put him and his wife on the same shifts. "This month, we have nearly opposite schedules, but that is rare," he says. "Next month, we will be back to working the same shifts."

Construction Update

The exterior of the new Barnes-Jewish Center for Outpatient Health is nearly finished, and crews are currently ahead of schedule completing the interior design. The 12-story structure at the corner of Euclid and Forest Park Parkway is scheduled to open in spring 2012, with the hospital's outpatient resident clinics on the lower levels, clinics and a radiology satellite on the middle floors and office spaces capping out the floorplan. There is a connection to the Forest Park/Laclede Garage for a covered patient drop-off area and link to the other campus buildings.
